



# **WA Single-Use Plastic Bans**

# **BANNED 2022**

- **1 JULY** 🚫 Disposable plastic straws and cutlery
  - Disposable plastic plates and unlidded bowls
  - Expanded polystyrene food containers/trays
  - 2 All plastic shopping bags (of any thickness)
- **1 OCT** Oisposable plastic cups for cold drinks



# BANNED 2023

- **1 SEPT** 🙆 Plastic microbeads
  - **3** Cotton buds with plastic stems
  - Degradable plastics
  - 3 Loose-fill expanded plastic packaging



# **BANNED 2024**

- 1 MAR 🛛 🙆 Plastic cups for hot drinks
  - 3 Plastic cup lids/seals
  - Onlidded plastic food trays
- **1 SEPT** (3) Non-compostable plastic produce bags (for fresh fruit and vegetables)
  - Disposable plastic containers and lids (for eat-in and takeaway food)

# **BANNED 2025**

1 JULY

Moulded expanded plastic packaging (for non-fragile items under 45 kg)







Plastic-lined paper and compostable plastics are banned for some items. Specific requirements and exemptions apply. Businesses are encouraged to regularly check the website for updates.

# **Support for business**

The Western Australian Government is implementing further bans on single-use plastics from 2023 to 2025.

Through the National Retail Association (NRA), the government is taking an education-first approach to assist retailers and suppliers to understand the ban, their obligations and how to comply.

The NRA team is providing a range of free services for businesses seeking information or advice about the ban. This includes a dedicated website, tollfree hotline for businesses, online information sessions, factsheets, signage, and visits to 4,000 retail stores across Western Australia.

Government, community and industry organisations are encouraged to distribute information about the ban (and the free support services available) to businesses in their network.
